

Dear Committee:

The English Department approved an Area of Emphasis in American Literature in February 2009 at a meeting of the full faculty. Unfortunately, very shortly afterwards we lost three of our American literature faculty at once (one to retirement, one to sudden illness, and another to a different institution). Under such circumstances, we felt we could not offer the area of emphasis. This year, however, we have been able to hire two tenure-track assistant professors in American Literature and are confident that we will be able to add this important Area of Emphasis in our curriculum.

MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

A baccalaureate degree program must require at least 21 semester hours of upper division courses in the major field and at least 39 semester hours of upper division work overall. Students in the Franklin College must earn a grade of "C" (2.0) or better in major required courses.

Required Courses (18 hours)

(A grade of "C" (2.0) or better must be achieved in all major courses. Competency in one Foreign Language through the fourth semester required. Seven of the ten major courses must be taken in residence. Lower-division and Upper-division ENGL courses taken through Independent and Distance Learning do not count towards the major.) Eight of the ten major courses must be taken at the 4000-level.
